The Church in Europe

Time flies. And not always as you're having fun. But yes, especially while you are on vacation, it's amazing how one can lose track of days and hours. Next thing you know its time to return home. Melani and I had a great time touring the German countryside and then our short visit into Scotland. The whole two weeks felt like the Amazing Race, where you wake and run to selected destinations; eating next to nothing and sleeping because you are exhausted. However, my race isn't over yet. I still have two and a half months to go. So, I have set my mind to learn more about the historical church of Europe and what it means for the church communities of America.

I have always made it a point to teach the important truth of the Reformation. Why we worship the way we do, what it means to be a Presbyterian Church, dates like October 31, 1517, and January 2, 1555 and Zwingli and Sausage Sunday. All these events stemmed from Martin Luther's Ninety-Five Theses on the door of the Church Castle at Wittenburg. Which changed the world and the church forever, making Europe the center of Christianity for the next 300 years, up until the 18th century and the age of world wars. From Napolean to Hitler the church of Europe

has declined and at the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, churches of Europe are either museums, charities, dance clubs, private residences, or one was a commercial business marketing home lighting and décor. Many are abandoned with sealed windows and doors. Even though these churches are no longer places of worship, proclaiming the risen Lord and the sacrifice he made for all, they are works of art, beautiful in all their ruin and change and for the believer, the Holy Spirit is felt, without doubt.

So, what happened? Here is a brief perspective from my travels and research. After the great wars the German population which was highly religious and content with how it was structured lost its faith. Lost its faith in God and lost its faith in man. Half of all church going communities stopped worshiping and the trend continued to decline. What happened? The sense of community that the church once held was forgotten and a secular reliance to survive any way possible took hold. Sunday became a day of pleasure and leisure rather than a day of worship. Where did this mind set come from? I would have to say, liberal theology, neo reformed ideas and a lack of gospel preaching messages and ministers. If pastors are not preaching the gospel; discipleship

humanity, sacrifice of self for the sake of the whole, sin and its reality, repentance and the forgiveness of sin, redemption by grace alone, through faith alone, from the Bible alone, to the glory of God alone; Christ crucified, risen and coming again, then one does not have a church. John 8:31-32 resounds eternally as a praise and a warning, "If you abide in my Word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

The Church in Europe became man (people) centered rather than Christ centered. Instead of God and a Kingdom focused church that did all things for the glory of God, it became a church that tried to fix its populace with a, "If you can't beat'em; join'em" mentality. And like the magnificent chapel of Bad Krausnick on the hill, it is empty. And only seen from a distance.

The Church of America is headed in the same direction. Systematic theology is lacking, doctrine is a bad word; an adjective describing an antiquated way of thought and not a noun that instills a sense of obligation and duty. Denomination is another word no one likes to hear or use. While, visiting patients one day, I was asked "What religion are you?" I vehemently shared, "I don't have religion. I am of the Christian faith. My theology is Reformed, and my ordaining body is the Presbyterian Church. My Lord is Jesus Christ the King. My heroes have always been cowboys, and they still are it seems, and John Knox and John Calvin are among them." Thankfully, the patient was a Texan and understood my point of view. I had to share the history of the First Presbyterian Church of San Antonio, TX and how Rev. McCullough was a genuine cowboy of 1880.

So, what is the way forward? Where do we go from here? I say we preach only the five solas: Sola Scriptura, Sola Fide, Solus

Christus, Sola Gratia and Soli Deo Gloria.

Sola Scriptura – Scripture alone is for faith and the instrument of authority. It measures itself.

Sola Fide – Faith Alone is the instrument of the Holy Spirit which justifies and proclaims Jesus is the way the truth and the life, no one comes to the Father except through his faith.

Solus Christus – Salvation comes from Jesus and the Cross. (refer to previous three Solas).

Sola Gratia – We are saved by grace, and this is not our doing. Oh, wretched man that I am, who will save me? Only Jesus and his grace and mercy, not by works. (Review Rosslyn Chapel and Sir William Sinclair).

Soli Deo Gloria – God is good all the time and all the time, God is good. To God be the glory through Jesus his son. Who gives us the victory, great things he has done.

On Sunday, January 5th we will take down the Christmas decorations and celebrate Sausage Sunday. Look for a sign-up sheet to contribute to Sausage Sunday. We will need sausages, sauerkraut, applesauce, rolls/bread, and desserts.

What is the history of Sausage Sunday? From an article by Russell P. Johnson (March 8, 2022) "The Affair of the Sausages and Religious Freedom"

Five hundred years ago today, some Swiss people ate sausages. This was a major event in the history of Christianity.

On March 9, 1522, several people gathered for dinner in the home of Christoph

Froschauer, a printer who lived in Zurich. Although it was during the liturgical season of Lent and the eating of meat was forbidden, Froschauer and his wife Elise served sausages instead of fish to the visitors. Their reasoning was that Lenten fasts were not prescribed in the Bible and thus not obligatory for Christians. Though Froschauer was not in principle opposed to fasting, the biblical texts he was printing did not necessitate abstention from meat for this forty-day period. And so—as a celebration of Christian freedom, as an act of political theater, and out of a genuine desire for a high-protein meal—he feasted on dry meats with his wife, his employees, and two local priests.

Word of their transgression quickly got out, and the people who partook of the sausages were jailed for breaking canon law. Swiss reformer Huldrych Zwingli, who was present but did not inhale, quickly took to the pulpit to defend them. In his sermon—subsequently printed by Froschauer after release—Zwingli interprets the New Testament passages that pertain to fasting, keeping traditions, and abstaining from certain foods. He argues that fasting serves a valuable purpose, especially for disciplining the desires of idle people, but that there is no biblical basis for making fasting or abstaining from meat legally obligatory for Christians. He writes, "abstinence from meat and drink is an old custom, which however later by the wickedness of some of the clergy came to be viewed as a command." He summarizes his case by saying, "if you will fast, do so; if you do not wish to eat meat, eat it not; but leave Christians a free choice in the matter."

Also, a reminder for any individual or group using the church kitchen. Please be sure when you use the facility to clean up afterward.
